

Tule Pond (Floyd Lamb)

FISHERY AND STOCKING INFORMATION

General information: Tule Pond is located at Floyd Lamb Park in northwest Las Vegas. This pond is one of a series of four ponds used for landscaping and irrigation. Tule is the largest, uppermost pond that is stocked. The other ponds are not stocked but may have resident fish. The primary fishing is comprised of Rainbow Trout and Channel Catfish, with catchable-sized fish stocked seasonally. No stocking occurs in July due to excessive heat. Bluegill are stocked occasionally. The pond is known to have Largemouth Bass and other resident sunfish species not stocked by Nevada Department of Wildlife.

Location: 9200 Tule Springs Road, Las Vegas, Clark County.

Size: The pond is approximately 5 acres with a maximum depth of 15 feet.

Management: Nevada Department of Wildlife manages the fishery as a Cold Water Urban Fishery during the colder months and a Warm Water Urban Fishery during the warmer months of the year. The pond and park are managed by the City of Las Vegas.

General Information

- Entrance fee \$6 per vehicle, credit or debit card only, **no cash**. Other fee options are available for annual passes.
- Park hours: Apr–Sep 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., Oct–Mar 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Regulations

- A fishing license is required for anglers 12 years of age or older. Season is open year-round during park hours.

- The Daily Limit is 3 game fish.**
- The Possession Limit is 2 times the daily limit of the water being fished.**
- The use of bait fish is prohibited.

Fishing Notes

- The 2024 average catch rates from interviewed anglers were 0.8 fish/hour and 1.3 fish/angler day.
- Angling for stocked trout and catfish is best within a week of stocking, though previously stocked fish may remain.
- Fishing slows in late spring (April) and late fall (October) as water temperatures change during the transition of seasons.
- Small spinners, various Power Baits, salmon eggs, and fly fishing are effective for catching Rainbow Trout.
- Try spinner baits and worms to catch Largemouth Bass and Bluegill.
- Prepared catfish baits, hot dogs, shrimp, and chicken liver have been used successfully for catfish.
