**Species:** Mule Deer

**Access:** Access is good with varying degrees of road quality. Highways 6/50, 93, 894, 487 and 21 (Utah) provide paved access in and around the area. White Pine County Roads 37 and 41, as well as the Gandy Road (Utah) provide good access around Unit 114. The Fourmile and Eightmile roads in Unit 114 provide access to the upper elevations. Both roads are passable, but very steep and rocky. There is a good network of 2-track roads throughout both units. The quality of these roads varies and can change depending on current weather conditions.

High clearance vehicles and extra spare tires are recommended. Hunters should watch the weather forecast, even during early season hunts. Summer thunderstorms and fall/winter snowstorms can drastically alter road conditions and hunter access.

Vehicles and mechanized equipment, including wheeled game carriers are prohibited in Wilderness. Contact the Federal Land Management Agency responsible for the area you intend to hunt for more information.

**Recommended Hunting Areas:** Unit 114 is a lower deer density unit, but there is still good hunting available. Miller Basin is a good place to find deer. The areas around Salt Marsh Canyon, Deerhead Canyon, Deadman Canyon, and Timber Creek hold some of the highest deer densities in the unit. The ridgeline and upper basins from Eightmile Canyon north to White Cloud Peak also have good deer habitat and numbers. Early in the season, The Table can be a popular area for backpack or horse hunters.

Unit 115 has fair deer density. Much of the higher elevations are in the national park and closed to hunting. During the early seasons, a lot of deer are still on Great Basin National Park. The west side of the unit from Williams Creek north to Strawberry Creek has good deer numbers. On the south end of the unit, Johns Wash, Murphy's Wash, and Big Spring Wash are good deer areas, especially late in the year. Lexington Canyon can have good deer numbers and gets better late in the year.

**Biologist Comments:** Hunters need to know where the Great Basin National Park Boundary is. HUNTING IS NOT ALLOWED ON GREAT BASIN NATIONAL PARK.

Hunters camping at the higher elevations of Unit 114 should stay aware of changing weather conditions as early winter storms can drastically alter road conditions and options for getting off the mountain.
