## Access:

These units are accessible via several well-maintained dirt roads off NV-305, NV-306, NV-278, and US-50. Four-wheel drive may be necessary when dirt roads are wet, and high clearance/four-wheel drive is necessary to access some side roads.

## **Recommended Hunting Areas:**

The highest pronghorn densities occur in the southern portion of unit 141, in the foothills of the Cortez range, and in the agricultural fields at the juncture of units 153 and 156. Other recommended hunting areas are Kobeh Valley (Unit 143), Crescent Valley (Unit 141), Grass Valley (Unit 154/155), and the agricultural fields in unit 151.

## **Biologist Comments:**

Most of this area is comprised of public land. Most pronghorn will be found in valley bottoms or on toe-slopes of the mountains, however, in units 151, 153, and 156 most pronghorn congregate on private property, specifically agricultural fields. It is the hunter's responsibility to determine land ownership and obtain permission prior to accessing or hunting on private property.

Battle Mountain and Austin provide gas, food and lodging, and a small hospital is in Battle Mountain. The BLM provides a developed campground at Mill Creek approximately 20 miles south of Battle Mountain. The USFS provides a fee campground at Bob Scott Summit on U.S. Highway 50 about six miles east of Austin. Dispersed camping at undeveloped sites is permitted throughout the hunting units on public lands. Check with the land management agencies for fire restrictions and dispersed camping regulations.
